PARK RANGERS AND SECURITY DIVISIONS OF KERN COUNTY GENERAL SERVICES

SUMMARY:

The term ranger dates to the 17th century in the United States and was drawn from the word range (to travel over a large area). The title "ranger" in the modern sense was first applied to the reorganization of the fire warden force in the Adirondack Park, after fires burned 80,000 acres in the park.

The first park rangers appeared in 1905, it was not until 11 years later that those national parks and the national park ranger were under a centralized government agency, the National Park Service. The national park ranger has evolved from soldiers in the Army to a profession. Park rangers are responsible for protecting our state and national parks, natural resources, ecosystems, and wildlife within them, and the people who visit them. Park rangers may serve as law enforcement officers, with the ability to cite, gather evidence, preserve scenes, carry weapons and arrest violators. (Per California Penal Code §830.31(b)). Park Rangers can also be environmental experts and historians. (See Bibliography)

PURPOSE OF INQUIRY:

California Penal Code §925 authorizes a Grand Jury to conduct an inquiry and report on various departments throughout the County. The 2018 - 2019 Kern County Grand Jury conducted an investigation into the operations of the Kern County Park Rangers and Security personnel and had six recommendations. As a follow-up, the 2021 - 2022 Kern County Grand Jury (Grand Jury) pursued these recommendations to a conclusion.

METHODOLOGY:

Along with reviewing the 2018 - 2019 Kern County Grand Jury report, the 2021 - 2022 Grand Jury inquired into the operations and management of the Kern County Park Rangers and Security personnel. The Grand Jury researched the internet and conducted interviews with the Kern County General Services Department, and the Park Ranger and Security personnel.

DISCUSSION OF FACTS:

On July 15, 2021, under the direction of the California Legislature (Government Code section 12525.5, subdivision (e)), the Racial and Identity Profiling Act (RIPA) and Racial and Identity Profiling Board (RIPA Board) was formed as part of AB953. Their charge was to eliminate racial and identity profiling, and improve diversity, racial and identity

sensitivity in law enforcement. The (RIPA Board) is a diverse group of members that represent the public, law enforcement and educators. The California Department of Justice, and Office of the Attorney General, has the primary oversite of the RIPA Board. One of the responsibilities of the RIPA Board has been to develop the stop-data collection process that has been included into Regulation as of January 1, 2021. (See Bibliography)

As part of their regular duties, Park Rangers are expected to identify violators by perceived race, ethnicity, gender, age, language, disability, and whether they are part of the LGBTQ+ Community.

The Grand Jury noted the following:

- A. There are many types of Rangers:
 - National Park Ranger Permanent
 - National Park Ranger Temporary/Seasonal

- C. In Kern County, the Park Rangers consists of 10% women and 90% men. Nationally, the Park Rangers are 33.8% women and 66.2% are men.
- D. There are 14,086 Park Rangers in the United States.
- E. The average National Park Ranger salary is \$47,253. The average Kern County Park Ranger salary is \$34,281.

FINDINGS:

- F1. Repair costs on vehicles have increased dramatically since the 2018 2019 Kern County Grand Jury report:
 - 2018 2019 **\$** 756
 - 2020 2021 \$47,843

There are 25 vehicles; six are 2006 models and 19 are 2013 or older.

- F2. Stop Data Collection Forms are required to satisfy RIPA Regulations. All Park Rangers must complete a report with each stop. This report is uploaded into the computer by a RIPA trained officer and given to the Chief Ranger who is responsible for forwarding the information to the California Department of Justice. (See Appendix)
- F3. As of January 1, 2022, the Peace Officers Standard of Training (POST) is no longer a requirement for the condition of hiring Park Rangers. This exemption allows for more individuals to qualify for employment. However, applicants are required to complete other training during their employment.
- F4. The Park Rangers have contracted with a local range facility for all their range qualification needs at no cost.
- F5. All Park Rangers carry trauma first-aid backpacks that **DO NOT** include Narcan[®] (Naloxone). Narcan[®] has become a well-known antidote to reverse an opioid overdose.
- F6. Park Rangers issue approximately 300 citations per month. Monies collected from citations goes directly into the Park Ranger budget.

- F7. The funded 24-member staff has not changed since the 2018 2019 Grand Jury report.
- F8. In 2021, Douglas County, Colorado Park Rangers launched a Mountain Bike Patrol Program that has steadily gained popularity. According to staff, *this allows for more frequent interactions with visitors*. It also allows for good trail

etiquette, assessment of conditions, and how people are using the trails and properties. (See Bibliography)

- F9. All-Terrain vehicles (ATVs) and watercraft training is provided by a Park Ranger stationed at Lake Isabella.
- F10. Park Rangers and Security Officers are certified to use the California Law Enforcement Tracking System (CLETS) and the Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS) as needed.
- F11. A background check and Live Scan[®] are conducted prior to hiring a Park Ranger. There is also a complex psychological and physically demanding aspect of the test that includes swimming. Security positions use the basic Kern County background check procedures and do not require these security positions to pass the swim portion of the test.
- F12. Security Officers are also responsible for the safety and security of individuals at some County buildings.
- F13. Due to the large acreage of Hart Park and Lake Ming, there are rough terrains, off-road paths, and Riparian Preserve areas, which are in desperate need of non-motorized patrol. Park Rangers do not have bicycles. According to staff these would allow them to patrol areas with ease.
- F14. The most common animals abandoned at Hart Park and Lake Ming are cats, but pigs, goats, and chickens have been abandoned as well.
- F15. Over the years, Hart Park and Lake Ming have been overwhelmed with homeless individuals and overnight camping, which is prohibited.
- F16. Two Park Rangers (Homeless Enforcement Team) are specifically assigned to handle the needs and complaints concerning the homeless.

COMMENTS:

In 2018 – 2019 the Grand Jury authored a report on Park Rangers and Security, which made six recommendations. The Park Ranger and Security personnel are commended for completing all recommendations in a timely manner. The Grand Jury would like to thank all General Service employees who participated in gathering information for this report.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- R1. By November 30, 2022, one additional staff member should be hired full-time in an administrative position to assist the Chief Ranger with RIPA regulated paperwork as required. This would free up two Rangers to resume their regular duties. (Finding 2)
- R2. By January 1, 2023, the Park Rangers should purchase four electric bicycles: two for Hart Park and two for Lake Ming. (Findings 8 and 13)
- R3. By January 1, 2023, all Park Rangers should be trained and required to have Narcan[®] in their possession while on duty. (Finding 5)
- R4. By July 1, 2023, six additional staff should be hired: three full-time Park Rangers and three part-time Park Rangers. (Findings 2, 6, 14, 15 and 16)
- R5. By July 1, 2023, the current Park Ranger fleet should begin replacing aging vehicles, with better-equipped vehicles for off-road use. (Finding 1)
- R6. By January 1, 2024, Hart Park and Lake Ming should have 24-hour patrol coverage. According to staff, this will deter illegal animal drop-offs, overnight stays, and homeless encampments. (Findings 14, 15 and 16)
- R7. The Kern County Park Rangers and Security personnel should continue to apply for grants for additional funding. (Findings, 1, 6, 7, 8, 12, 14 and 15)

Kern County Board of Supervisors Response to Grand Jury Final Report Park Rangers And Security Divisions of Kern County General Services

Response to Findings F1-F16:

Kern County agrees with the Grand Jury's findings.

Response to Recommendation:

R1: By November 30, 2022, one additional staff member should be hired full-time in an administrative position to assist the Chief Ranger with RIPA regulated paperwork as required. This would free up two Rangers to resume their regular duties.

The County agrees that it is challenging for Rangers to fully comply with RIPA regulated paperwork and perform their main duties. The Rangers are doing their best to accomplish both tasks with available staff. The County will further analyze this issue to find efficiencies in processes and weigh other alternatives, taking into consideration the budget constraints it faces.

R2: By January 1, 2023, the Park Rangers should purchase four electric bicycles: two for Hart Park and two for Lake Ming.

This recommendation will require further analysis. At this point, the County does not think this is a viable option to use. While electric bikes allow a more environmentally friendly way to more closely interact with Park users, with the uneven terrain of the grounds within the parks, and the ability to respond to an imminent threat without jeopardizing the safety of Rangers, a patrol vehicle provides better coverage of the parks at the current staffing level. The County will need to further assess the operational impacts as well as cost of funding additional staff considering budgetary constraints. Additionally, General Services has obtained through a grant one new OHV that, along with existing quads for use in the Kern River corridor, will facilitate more nimble access within the Kern River Parkway

R3: By January 1, 2023, all Park Rangers should be trained and required to have Narcan[®] in their possession while on duty.

This recommendation has been implemented. Rangers have been trained on the use of Narcan, and Rangers are provided Narcan for use as well as keeping a supply available at Ranger Stations.

R4: By July 1, 2023, six additional staff should be hired: three full-time Park Rangers and three part-time Park Rangers.

The recommendation to hire six additional staff will require further analysis. The County is evaluating operational improvements to enhance services within the limited resources available. Analysis will need to examine ideal staffing levels and operations in conjunction with the availability of funding.

R5: By July 1, 2023, the current Park Ranger fleet should begin replacing aging vehicles, with better equipped vehicles for off-road use.

County agrees aging vehicles need to be replaced. Implementation of this recommendation requires further analysis in terms of availability of funding within budgetary constraints facing the County.

R6: By January 1, 2024, Hart Park and Lake Ming should have 24-hour patrol coverage. According to staff, this will deter illegal animal drop-offs, overnight stays, and homeless encampments.

The County agrees that Hart Park and Lake Ming should have 24-hour patrol coverage in order to deter all illegal activities. However, in order to accomplish that, additional staff is needed. This recommendation requires further analysis to determine the level of staffing in light of current budget constraints.

R7: The Kern County Park Rangers and Security personnel should continue to apply for grants for additional funding.

The County concurs and will continue to seek out grant opportunities that are applicable to Ranger operations.
